

Chad is in a networking and referral group I'm part of called LeTip. When I first joined the group, I was partnering with another company to launch a similar-type product in Sun City Summerlin.

He was willing to advertise in that newspaper, but the first thing he told me was, "I'll do this, but you really should start one in Skye Canyon."

My first thought was, "OK, where the heck is Skye Canyon."

He told me about it and I started to do some research. It has everything I was looking for. It's a growing com-

munity with an vibrant and active group of residents.

For the first three issues, my plan is to print 1,000 copies and mail them to new movers into the area, along with dropping them off at various local businesses in the area.

In January, I will expand my print run to 5,000 copies and mail copies to every home in Skye Canyon, along with placing copies out where people can pick it up.

So check it out. The first issue profiles Ward 6 city councilwoman Nancy Brune, who represents Skye Canyon. We also feature the new Sicilian Guys Trattoria and a fun Skye Canyon Facebook group related to bourbon tasting. 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Brune eyes ‘smart growth’ for Skye Canyon

Las Vegas City Council Member Nancy Brune was elected to the five-member panel in November 2022. Her district includes Skye Canyon, along with Tule Springs, the Tule Springs Fossil Beds National Monument and master-planned communities, including Floyd Lamb Park.

Before running for office, Brune served as the founding executive director of the bipartisan Kenny Guinn Center for Policy Priorities. She is currently a research professor at the Desert Research Institute and a principal at the Luz Development Institute. We recently spoke with her about her work and what drives it.

Question: *What prompted you to run for the Las Vegas City Council?*

Brune: I was motivated by a couple of reasons to run. One was smart growth, and related to that is community engagement. When I was knocking on doors, I heard people say “Growth is coming,” but it feels like the growth is being done to us so we never have a chance to weigh in on community projects or what goes where.

Question: *How do you reach out to your constituents?*

Brune: I’m trying to be very intentional about holding community meetings or putting information out there about projects so that citizens or residents can weigh in. When there was a proposed Walmart that was going in near Skye Canyon, somebody actually said, “Oh, I don’t think people would mind.” So I said that I’ll do a survey. We’ll knock on doors to figure it out if people do in fact want a Walmart.

“Most people don’t do a survey. Three thousand people responded. Eighty percent were opposed. So, I took that back to (the community) and I said the community does not want or think the Walmart is appropriate. They are ok with commercial. They understand this (land) is zoned commercial, but they don’t want a Walmart. The community said we will work with the developer to try to bring in businesses that we think our community wants. So, I feel like I’ve honored that promise to the residents to listen to them and represent them, and then the other issue was housing.

“At the Guinn Center I did a lot of work with the (Nevada) Legislature and realized over the last couple of years of being up in Carson City, that a lot of the policies around housing, even if the state Legislature passes them, ultimately then the cities and counties... are then in charge of implementation. So, I realized that if I wanted to help with housing maybe the city council or lo-

cal government was the place to be. That’s what motivated me.

“We have added some new housing units out here in the northwest. I feel like I’ve been less successful on that front because to actually move the needle for the 100,000 affordable workforce units that we need we need many more resources as a region, so I feel like there’s a lot of room for growth in that area. I do think to really move the needle on the housing that we need we do need greater assistance from the federal government.

Brune says she is “not a big government person,” but the problems that we’re facing here are not unique to Las Vegas. “I think it’s especially sad that Las Vegas used to be the place that you could live the American Dream, buy an entry-level

house, get a great job on The Strip. Every community in the country is suffering from the lack of affordable housing. I do feel like the nature of the problem is so huge that we do need federal relief.”

Brune notes that Nevadans do not have enough housing vouchers, which are provided by the federal government to help Americans with their monthly rent payments, are based on a population-based formula.”

The vouchers help American pay for residential rental properties. The formula has not been changed in decades. Chicago, which has fewer people than the metropolitan area of Clark County gets more vouchers than we do, Brune says.

“So, our (congressional delegation) is in conversation with the federal government to try to change that formula.

New restaurant brings Sicilian flair to Skye Canyon

The last time Chef Ignazio Sessa decided to open a restaurant in Skye Canyon was early 2020 when he opened The Omelette Cafe in the Skye Canyon Marketplace.

As it turns out, the timing wasn't great as the COVID-19 pandemic hit right as he was about to open.

"We signed the lease March 3. I went to Florida for my son's baseball trip and then COVID hit and we had to shut everything down," Sessa said. "We finally opened up an 20 percent, then 30 percent capacity."

The timing is a little better now with his new Sicilian Guys Trattoria, which opened in August in the space formerly occupied by the Bob's Big Boy in the same center as Omelet Cafe.

It's the second Sicilian Guys res-

taurant Sessa has launched. In 2023, he opened Sicilian Guys Pizzeria on Lake Mead and Rampart, next to Sun City Summerlin.

"We opened two restaurants in this horrible economy," said Sessa, who has been in the restaurant business for 30 years. "People think I'm nuts. But we put a lot of people to work. That's one of the things I'm proud of. Between my four locations, we have over 120 employees."

Sessa and his family first acquired the Omelette House in the same center he eventually added the pizzeria in 2006 ... again with terrible timing with the economic downturn.

"We went through all that crap in 2007-8," he said. "Myself and my wife and my mom and dad, we worked at that business. We grinded until we got to 2009 and started profiting after that. 15 years later, we're still going

strong. Sun City loves us."

While the two breakfast places have become a big hit, Sessa always wanted to return to his Sicilian roots, hence his two Sicilian Guys restaurants.

"I've always wanted to do something like this," he said. "Bring a Sicilian flair. I wanted a traditional Sicilian restaurant. You'll see we don't fettuccine Alfredo or spaghetti and meatballs. Olive Garden can do that."

Instead, he offers meals like Braciolo, which is thin slices of beef, rolled and stuffed with prosciutto, provolone, Parmesan garlic, a hard-boiled egg and fresh herbs. Then it's sautéed and simmered in a rich tomato sauce and served with two Braciolo and Sicilian Herb potatoes.

"We roll it up and simmer it for

four hours before we serve it," Sessa said, adding it's only available on Sundays.

But for the less adventurous, you can choose from a wide variety of pizzas, including stuffed deep dish pizzas.

Sessa chose to expand into the Skye Canyon area because he loves the community. He feels it's like Summerlin from 1995-99, when it really took off as the fastest growing master-plan in the country.

"We're gonna have great things up here," Sessa said. "It's a fun, young community. So much growth. I knew we could definitely do something cool up here with two restaurants."

Something cool includes live music every Wednesday night from 5-8 p.m. He also says the patio dining area is "pet friendly" as a way to encourage families to come out.

Skye Canyon Facebook group gains 'spirited' membership

Steve Acciarito moved his family into Skye Canyon in 2001 and as a way to get to know some of his neighbors, created a Facebook page dedicated to people in the community who liked to drink bourbon.

Suffice it to say, Acciarito has made a lot of new friends. He created this group in May of this year and it has since grown to 95 members. It's also grown from just a bourbon group to now include whiskey, rye, scotch and tequila.

"I thought it would be a fun way to make friends, hang out with other bourbon lovers and share bottles, tips, etc.," he said.

He didn't know that it would take off so quickly.

"I think we had like 50 members within the first 48 hours," Acciarito said. "Right now, we are up to 94 members (since grown to 95). I try to keep it as local to Skye Canyon as possible hence the questions when you ask to join the group."

The group has already had small-

er get-togethers, but Acciarito is hoping to up the game a little bit more.

Acciarito had initially planned to host a bourbon tasting at the community center, but due to some logistical issues, the event is being moved to a new location in Skye Canyon. He's still finalizing the date, but it will be either Oct. 28 or 29 from 6-8 p.m.

"We have a lot of events that are more family/children based, but not a lot of 'adult only' events," Acciarito said. "The event is not about trying to grow my group but more about a social gathering for people to enjoy and talk about bourbon. But if the group grows, well hey, I'm all for it!"

Acciarito loves bourbon, but also loves the Skye Canyon community as well.

"My wife and I love this area. It's close enough to the action but far enough away to enjoy peace and quiet. I love the access to the trails and mountains as well. As for myself I like to run and bike (mountain and gravel, I stay off the roads)."
